You'd think that having the first week of our recent program series postponed by a snowstorm would have dampened our spirits, but it didn't turn out that way. Once the snow melted, the kids and youth turned out in force, and we enjoyed being together, working on art projects and playing outdoors. Many thanks to Becca Gardner, Sadie Santio and SueAnn Cotonuts for their leadership, to Ute Tribe Transit and its drivers for providing a bus, and to all the families of the young people.

Along with drawing and other arts and crafts which the kids enjoy so much, we introduced some traditional elements. The youth took turns smudging each other in our Talking Circles, as Becca explained how to cleanse ourselves to prepare for the day's activities. A high point of our programs was Geraldina Selestewa and her son Oakley introducing us to Handgame, very popular at Pow Wows and other gatherings. (Oakley inspired a new generation of drummers and singers!) Sadie Santio led the kids in a simple basket-weaving project and helped the youth get started with beading. "I wasn't going to come today," one of the older boys said, "but I'm sure glad I did!"





We're grateful to all the donors who make these programs possible, especially the Eccles Foundation and the Episcopal Diocese of Utah. We were blessed to serve more than forty young people and we look forward to more excitement in the Spring after-school series and in our Summer Camps. We can see the impact on the young people—it's just as the name implies: Art Empowers.



The month of March had a lot of firsts for youth group, it was also a busy one for us. We had our first elder for our Elder of the month program. Ginny didn't have a whole for a us to do, but we took her staple groceries every other week, also making her and her sister dinner once a week. Youth group had our first field trip of the year, and it was to the dinosaur quarry, where we played games, icebreakers, journaling, even took a mini hike. And just got to sit and enjoy all of God's creation. That day we had to take both vans which were filled with 15 teens. On April 9, we took 7 of our teens out to SLC on a special Tour of the University of Utah. It was special and very inspiring because it was given by two of our very own former youth group members, Pepper and Maria Alanis. We are all so proud of them and all the hard work they're doing. After the tour was done, I asked, "Ok so who's all going to college?" and all the teens raised their hands. It was such an amazing blessing to show them they too can attend the U of U.

Back in November of 2021, I came up with the idea of St. Elizabeth's having a Clothing room and a Food room in our Parish Hall. I wanted St. Elizabeth's to be the church that people on the reservation could come to when or if they need clothing or food. Last year this was all just a dream, one that I thought I was in over my head with. But anyone that knows when I say I want to do something, it's in the making. So, with donations and a little bit of time, we at St. Elizabeth's now have a clothing and a food room. We are always in need for donations for both rooms.


