Eleven years ago Pat Sanger, a social worker from Park City, and Rev. Sue Duffield started the Arts-Kids program in Whiterocks. They had a vision for helping young people through expressive arts, which they backed up with dynamic leadership. In the early days we were fortunate to be supported by generous grants from the Diocese of Utah and by the administrative oversight of Arts-Kids, Inc.
