Unexpected Gifts

In his last conversation with his disciples, Jesus offered a heartfelt prayer for their unity. He had washed their feet, showing them that a Great One must be a servant to all, and he'd commanded them to love each other. Finally he prayed. "Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one as you and I are one." (John 17:11)

While it makes sense for the followers of Jesus to be unified, it often hasn't worked out that way. We have our own understandings of the Bible and local traditions differ. History records many conflicts and even wars between groups of people who called themselves Christians. I imagine Jesus watching all this with a heavy heart, sadly disappointed that his prayer has not yet been answered.

Recently I preached about "The West," seen by European immigrants as a place of unlimited opportunity. Land that seemed "wide open" was taken by homesteaders, ranchers and

miners, with no consideration for its original residents. On the contrary, Native people were betrayed by our leaders, forced onto reservations and often killed by either gunfire or disease. While my family members were latecomers to this region, our presence here gives me a sense of responsibility for the actions of the trailblazers.

Some European-Americans have a more personal connection with the westward movement. On Sunday, December 10 we received an extraordinary gift from Patty Christina Willis, a pastor in Salt Lake City descended from Utah's "pioneers." She knit into a beautiful prayer shawl her love for these mountains and the yearning in her heart for reconciliation.

"With this shawl I acknowledge the suffering that was caused by the white settlers among whom were my ancestors," she wrote. "I pray for reconciliation and

My name Patty comes from my great grandmother and her grandmother who came to the valley in a covered wagon in the 1840s. I have felt them with me as my heart yearns for reconciliation. The yarn from this shawl comes from many places---from alpacas in Maine to sheep in South Dakota. When I was knitting, I held my ancestor David Sessions (my great grandmother's grandfather) and his legacy of settling these lands that were already occupied by your people. I wove into this shawl his love of making rows to harvest that caused pain he could not understand and the mountains beloved of him and the Ute people, the sun that rises above us all, and the affirming beauty of the sunset. With this shawl I acknowledge the suffering that was caused by the white settlers among whom were my ancestors. I pray for reconciliation and affirm the survival of your people at great odds. May you be well. May you be whole. May God continue to shine on you as the sun.

Mormon, the other mostly Ute. Can the faith we share help us to get to know one another despite our differences?

This is a time for us to sit with this offering, grateful for all that went into giving it. Perhaps some of us would like to enter into conversation, listening to one another and sharing our own stories. I hope we can pray together for mutual respect and caring among all of God's children. And I offer heartfelt thanks to Patty for these generous and unexpected gifts.






